## **Our Story - Continued**

In the first edition we shared a timeline of memorable moments that we've shared together since the community group started.

Here's what we've been up to since February this year.

**FEB 2023** Regular gardening sessions started up again at St Anne's Community Garden. Local people coming together to grow fruit, veg and flowers free for the community.



**MARCH** On March 29th, we hosted the first community Afternoon Tea. After a visit to a similar event in Netherton a group of women got together and brought food, fun and afternoon dancing to this community.

A group of women with a passion for creativity and kids started the family craft club. It's every Tuesday straight from school at St Anne's Community Centre. Donations keep the club running.

**MAY** The Thursday morning social group found a new home in the Hub at Beech Hill Primary School, thanks to the kindness of the school. It's open every Thursday during term time from 9am-12 noon. Everyone is welcome.

Sunday 7th May saw neighbours getting together for Picnic in the Park to have a good time together and celebrate the coronation. Around 250-300 people joined in and a thoroughly good time was had by all.



On Sat 13th May, we held a community party that included this community group's Annual General Meeting. We shared the results from the community survey, where we all agreed that it would be good to have more parties to bring us together. We hosted two community play days during the half-term holidays, one at St Andrew's School and one at St Anne's Community Centre. We'd really like to thank both of the venues for the way they contribute to the community.

**JUNE** Children and young people from Year 6 at Beech Hill Primary School worked alongside Media Cubs to explore what community means to them and learn new skills in journalism at the same time.



We hosted a Community Cash event at St Anne's Community Centre. This event was called Cake and Cash, as we ate cake together whilst deciding which community ideas to invest in. We hosted our second Afternoon Tea on 21st June, this time at St Anne's Community Centre. Everyone had a great time. It was great to see people from St Andrew's Parish Centre attend and then host their own afternoon tea for parishioners to raise funds for the Church. Penny Arcade is becoming an afternoon tea classic.

**JULY** We joined up with Wates to tackle some green spaces in the community.

The Playbox arrived at Beech Hill Play Park for a couple of weeks of community play. What fun we had.

**AUGUST** The 3rd annual Springfield Dog Show took place on the 9th of August after being rained off in July.

We hosted amazing play days at Diggle St Park, St Andrew's School and St Anne's Community Centre.

**SEPTEMBER** The annual community awards event took place on the 14th September, what a great evening that was.

On the same day Ben launched Community Toolmates, a group for men who like to get stuck in doing good stuff to help the community. They meet once a fortnight on a Thursday morning.

We had our first Apple Day in the community garden, picking apples, printing and sharing delicious homemade cakes. Neighbours also brought their own produce to share with the community.



We hosted the 3rd community afternoon tea, again at St Anne's Community Centre. This is fast becoming a much loved part of community life.

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# Ey Up, Let's Party

In November last year, we ran a survey on the community Facebook group and hosted some conversation groups in the community to see what people think and feel about living around here.

One thing we heard loud and clear is that parties bring people together and we want more opportunities to party and play together.

So that's the plan! We enjoyed two parties in May. The first one was at Diggle St Park on Sunday 7th May. Neighbours came together for a Picnic in the Park and to celebrate the Coronation of the King. Around 250-300 people joined in, and a thoroughly good time was had by all, with so many people commenting about how great it was to see the park so well used.

Over the afternoon, face painting was provided by Lisa, a community member who recently set up her business after successfully pitching at Community Cash.

Caroline George, a local singer, entertained us for an hour, and it was great to see her



Mum dancing along to her tunes. There was a bubble workshop from Ebulio, which was thoroughly enjoyed by all. A coronation-themed arts and crafts table was hosted by Vicky and loved by children. And children (and adults!) enjoyed the inflatable slide. Thanks to Brenda and her stewarding. It's no mean task keeping order on the inflatables.

We could put the party on for free thanks to a successful funding application to Awards for All.

The second party, the community party, was hosted at St Anne's Community Centre on 13th May. It was a glorious sunny day, and we couldn't have picked a better afternoon to party. It was also an opportunity to hold the Annual General Meeting for this community group. A little area was set up where people could learn more about the group, look at the annual report and accounts and decide if they'd like to get more involved.

The group meets once every two weeks for 90 minutes. After the party, we welcomed Sandra, Phil, Brenda, Sam, Lisa, Ben and Vicky to the organising group.

On the day, we also enjoyed tricks from a magician, tried out balloon modelling and watched Ryan almost melt as we listened to him singing in the garden. Sam made sandwiches and a scone for adults, and there were hot dogs and ice cream for the kids.





## The Springfield Dog Show

The dog show is a real community affair and wouldn't happen without the contribution of so many people.



## **Community Awards 2023**

Thursday, 14th September, saw our 2nd annual community awards event. Hosted in the nearby Wigan Sports Club, it was another magical evening which revealed more amazing people and places in our community.



The nomination forms were available all through the month of July in community spaces, including local church halls and shops, as well as online.

This year, the awards were split into 8 categories, to give people some ideas about who could be nominated and also to encourage people to think a bit more about our young people.

The categories were: Young Community Member, Places of Welcome, Community Minded Business, Welcoming Neighbour, Community Connector, Community Care Taker, Local Worker and Most Playful and Community Minded Street.

We were blown away to receive a whopping 97 nominations for 58 people or places.

After being greeted on arrival with a drink and shown to their tables, guests were treated to a quick welcome before an energetic and complex dance routine performed by dancers from local FLD Dance.

#### The Young Community Member

awards were given out by Vicky, a member of the organising circle, who gave up her nomination to help with the planning of the event.

It's fair to say the room was overwhelmed by the inspiring young people doing great things in our community, such as running businesses, being Young Leaders and raising money for charities.

#### Community Care Takers were

up next, and local community gardeners, pantry organisers and litter pickers received their awards for their tireless and selfless dedication to looking after our community, including Jude and Victoria, who were nominated and, in turn, nominated others.

#### A host of **Community**

**Connectors** were awarded with a strong presence from St Andrew's Community (church, community & school) who, as well as having many Community Connectors, were also nominated as **Place of Welcome.** 

Lots of **Local Workers** were nominated, including Ice Cream National Award Winner Raheim and Local Shop Manager David, street party to celebrate as we couldn't fit everyone in on the evening.

A few local businesses were awarded for being communityminded, including Spoons Café and Deli and Michelle at Bird'th Hand.

Last year, Phyll Cullen was presented with a trophy for her long service to the community, both as a community activist Not an easy decision to make, but there could only be one award, and it went to Young Community Member Tommy, who received 7 nominations after starting his own business, raising Autism awareness and donating to charity.

The evening concluded with a heartfelt speech from 2 time nominated Community Connector Vera, who reminded us all to be thankful to everyone



who received an unprecedented 12 nominations for his dedication to looking after his customers.

Pearl Street, Colliery Meadow and Thickness Avenue were nominated as **Welcoming Streets** in our community, and then as a councillor.

This year, Phyll sponsored an award, the **Councillors Award** and chose one of the nominees who'd received more than 3 nominations to present an award to. in day-to-day life for the little things as well as the big things.

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## Community Cash Investing in local people's ideas

Since November 2022, and thanks to some funds from Northern Heart and Soul CiC, we've been able to put small amounts of cash directly into local people's hands.

Supporting ideas for the common good and enabling local business ideas that are of benefit to the community to grow. Once all the ideas have been heard, the votes are counted, usually by a young person, and news is shared and money is released the next day.

Support to keep track of the money is offered by a community group member if needed and whoever receives investment returns to the next gathering to report back and share their story.

So far, we've invested in Phil's community bike club, which is now raising enough funds to "It was really nerve-wracking to do it, to get up and pitch your idea. It was really nice, though, that people believed in what I was wanting to do and said yes."

The gatherings, which happen once every few months, change their name depending on what we eat together while listening to the pitches. So far, we've had Cash and Chips, Pies and Pounds and Cash and Cake.

The idea behind the gatherings is simple. Local people pitch their ideas to other members of the community. Between £200 and £250 is up for grabs to get things going. Whoever is in the room has a vote. We decide together.

Community voters choose one of four options. 1. Fund the idea 2. Part fund the idea 3. Like the idea, it just needs more work 4. Don't support the idea look after itself; a community defibrillator which has been part funded by Brighter Borough, a face painting business; a litter picking trolley; a Christmas show; arts materials for the family craft club and gardening materials for Give it a Grow at St Anne's Community Centre.

Lisa Sedgwick pitched for £250 to get her face painting business going. She had the skills and just needed a little bit of cash to buy the equipment and get herself insured.



Since setting up the business, Lisa has been paid to provide face painting at a couple of community events as well as supporting some charity events, she's also been booked for private parties and christenings.

## The Family Craft Club

The family craft club grew out of women sharing their love of craft and talking about how they loved crafting with their children and grandchildren.

The outside space at St Anne's Community Centre is also available for children to play in and use, and the children have made things like bird feeders for the garden whilst enjoying eating the strawberries and peas in pods that grow there.

Children of any age are welcome as long as they are accompanied by an adult.

The plan is to keep things free as times are tough enough

for many. Tea and coffee are available for 20p, and there's a small snack and drink for the children. It's run on a donation basis.

The club has had some support from Brighter Borough, and Brenda also successfully pitched at the last community cash for some art materials.

Annie's Pantry provides bread for toast, and Ben of Community ToolMates made some insect houses for the children to decorate and dot around the garden. It's a real community affair.

The Family Craft Club runs from 3pm to 5pm every Tuesday during term time.

"There are lots of activities around for children who want to do sports and little for those who want to get crafty and creative. That's what the craft club is for.

Bringing families together for some quality time and let their imaginations run wild. Doing things that perhaps they might not get to do together at home."

#### **SEASONAL GARDEN TIPS**

**Sow Salad leaves** You can still grow salads in autumn, and they're easily grown in containers.

**Plant Trees** Bare root trees and hedges are often low cost and this time of year onwards is perfect to plant.

**Plant bulbs** Spring bulbs will give you a beautiful display and will help to early pollinators. Snake's head fritillary, crocus and muscari are great. We offer free bulbs, just get in touch.

**Bird Food** Encourage birds with a regularly topped-up bird feeder.

**Falling Leaves** You can ignore leaves if they're not bothering you, as they provide shelter and protection for wildlife. You can also collect them to create a leaf mulch pile - it'll rot down and be amazing to use in the garden.

**Trim Hedges** All baby birds have fledged, so now is a good time for a trim.

**Add Mulch** If you're struggling with your soil, then adding a layer of mulch onto your

borders will help replenish it for spring.

Even if soil is ok, it'll boost your plants and help protect them over winter.

#### Create a wildflower meadow

Now is a good time to sow wildflower seeds if you want a cottage garden feel that bees and butterflies love. We offer free seeds too!

**Don't be too tidy** Birds love seed heads so don't be too quick to chop. Insects also shelter in old stems over winter. You can also keep the lawn longer if you're not using it so much.





## Feature: St Andrew's

Jean received a double award at the Springfield, Beech Hill and Gidlow Annual Community Awards this year.

Jean was nominated as a Community Connector and the Parish Centre she loves and gifts much of her time to, St Andrew's, was nominated as a Place of Welcome.

Angela caught up with Jean to ask her a few questions.

#### So, Jean, what did you think about the nominations you received?

Lovely. Amazing. Never expected anything, a nice surprise. Although I have done a lot of volunteer work all my life (I'm 74 till January), not many people know exactly what I do.

#### What's the story then? How did you become involved in St Andrew's Parish Centre?

Initially, I was secretary of the Friends of St Andrew's school and did a lot of organising and fundraising for the school during Mr Rees' time as headmaster. And I worked in school as an additional learning assistant.

I left because my husband had two heart attacks. But later, I found myself taking on the Social Committee at church and switched my volunteering and fundraising to St Andrew's Church. I have to say, though, even as a child, we used to Carol sing or do raffles and give the money to church. So it's in my DNA.

The Parish Centre - I was conned by Rev Colin Hurst! Lol. The secretary, treasurer/leasing officer left suddenly, and I was



persuaded to help out till a replacement could be found, as was Sandra.

Well, that was in 2008, and we are both still at it in 2023. Everyone thinks we do a good job, so no one wants to replace us! Sandra is the treasurer, and I'm the leasing officer/ secretary. All voluntary, of course. I don't think people realise that. That what we do is in our own time, and we are not paid.

# What's happening now that you really love?

Again, I love lots of things. The Friendship Circle came about because the lady who ran the Ladies Fellowship died, and no one took it over. So I had a word with my friend, Irene and the Friendship Circle was born. I wanted to do something to 'give back' to the older generation as they had always provided for us when we were young. They had kept the church going. And I wanted it to be a social event costing as little as possible. We've been doing it for a few years now, and they love it.

# What are your hopes for the future?

I find this hard to answer as, at my age, I don't think about the future; I live each day as it comes. My husband died 4 years ago, and I'm still living in the past. Although my 4 children keep pushing me forward into the 21st century. And my grandchildren keep me young. I guess I hope I can continue helping people and organising events forever.

## Is there anything I've not asked that you'd like to say?

Well, the only other thing I can think of is I like knitting, sewing, arts and crafts, writing, as you can see, among other things. So when Sandra asks for help making things, I do my best to help. Like knitting angels for the school children, knitting ducks to be given out at Easter, knitting poppies to help the veterans and making craft things for the playdays like the salt dough teddies and paper butterflies. It's all good fun. And when we're not doing these, we enjoy raising money for charities once a month on the last Friday. That is hard work but worth it.

I'm organising another Christmas Fayre this year on November 11th in the church from 10 am - 2 pm. These are usually a huge success, bringing in much-needed money for church and lots of fun and joy to visitors, especially the children. We have lots of amusements for them, including Santa Claus. It's truly a big social event.

Oh yes, I almost forgot about the pantomimes. I've been involved in a few. Meg Smethurst was our director, and Ken Rees was the Dame. I played his sidekick, such as Idle Jack, Wishee Washee, Silly Sally, and many more. I loved performing for all the children. I would willingly do another, but sadly, most of our players have passed. We ran for 5 nights. Not sure I could still do that, though.

In June, some young people at Beech Hill Primary School worked alongside Media Cubs to create their own media content around what community means to them.

matter who we are, we can solve these problems, even though they are hard.'

They also spoke about what they wanted to see in the future; including lower energy prices, more gardening to protect the bees, and more sports and play equipment. They sound like they have it all figured out to me!

During the film's premier, parents and carers were invited to a special screening at school before it went live on our Youtube channel @SBHGCom. It really is a wonderful short watch! We hope we can bring Media Cubs back so more children can have an experience of what working in the Media is like, and maybe even in our next edition, we can have the young people writing their own community content.

## **Women's Network**

In March, a new network was created for women who might like to share skills and food with each other.



There was a launch event at Fur Clemt to mark International Women's Day, and some of the members got together in August at Sunshine House.
